

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Answer Key

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Students: After reading "Connections," answer the following questions about kinds of work and workers in complete sentences. **Parents/Teachers**: Sample answers are below. The last answer will vary.

1. What is a job or occupation?

A job or occupation is a person's role in society and a way to make a living and earn an income. Occupations help civilization work.

2. Workers can be paid or unpaid. What are examples of each?

Examples of unpaid jobs include students, homemakers, scout leaders, recreational sports coaches, mentors and parents who help out in class. Many people have several of these jobs all at the same time.

3. Define employee, employer and boss.

An employee is a person who earns wages — or payment — for their work. An employer, also known as a boss, is the person to whom the employee reports and is the person who hires and pays the employee. A person becomes a boss from either buying or starting a business or being promoted into that leadership role. A boss at work may be called an owner, director, manager, officer or as in the case of your school, the principal.

4. What is the duration or length of work people do?

Most people spend up to 40 hours per week or more performing their job and do so for 30-50 years on average. The duration or length of jobs vary from temporary and seasonal to part-time or full-time. Judges on the U.S. Supreme Court have positions that last a lifetime. Elected officials like the president and senators have terms of a certain number of years.

5. How do people decide on and obtain jobs?

Many people decide what career to pursue based on their interests and skills. Some may have the same career for life, but others may choose to try many different careers over the years. Certain jobs require many years of education, while others can be learned on the job without any extra schooling.
