1. What are some of the names by which our country?

While the United States of America is our country’s official name, it is also called America, the United States, the U.S., the U.S.A. or “the States,” for short.

2. Describe the 50 states of the United States.

Fifty states exist in the United States. Washington D.C, which stands for District of Columbia, is a district, not a state. It is in between the states of Virginia and Maryland. The 50 states are Arizona, Washington, Nevada, Colorado, Missouri, New Mexico, Kansas, Tennessee, Florida, Virginia, West Virginia, California, Arkansas, Louisiana, New York, New Jersey, Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Delaware, Maryland, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Oklahoma, North Dakota, South Dakota, Vermont, Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, Alabama, Montana, Connecticut, Oregon, Hawaii, Alaska, Idaho and Texas.

3. What are some geographical features of the United States?

The major mountain ranges are the Appalachian Mountains and the Rocky Mountains. The longest river in the United States is the Mississippi River. It flows through Mississippi, Colorado and Missouri. Our neighbors are the border counties of Canada to the north and Mexico to the South. America borders the Pacific Ocean on the west and the Atlantic on the eastern side.

4. What are some facts and figues that tell more about America?

The population of the U.S. is about 330,175,936. America is the third largest country in the world and nearly has the third largest population of citizens. Located in North America, one of the seven continents, the country comprises 3,794,083 square miles. Each country has an official currency or specific type of money. The American currency is the dollar.



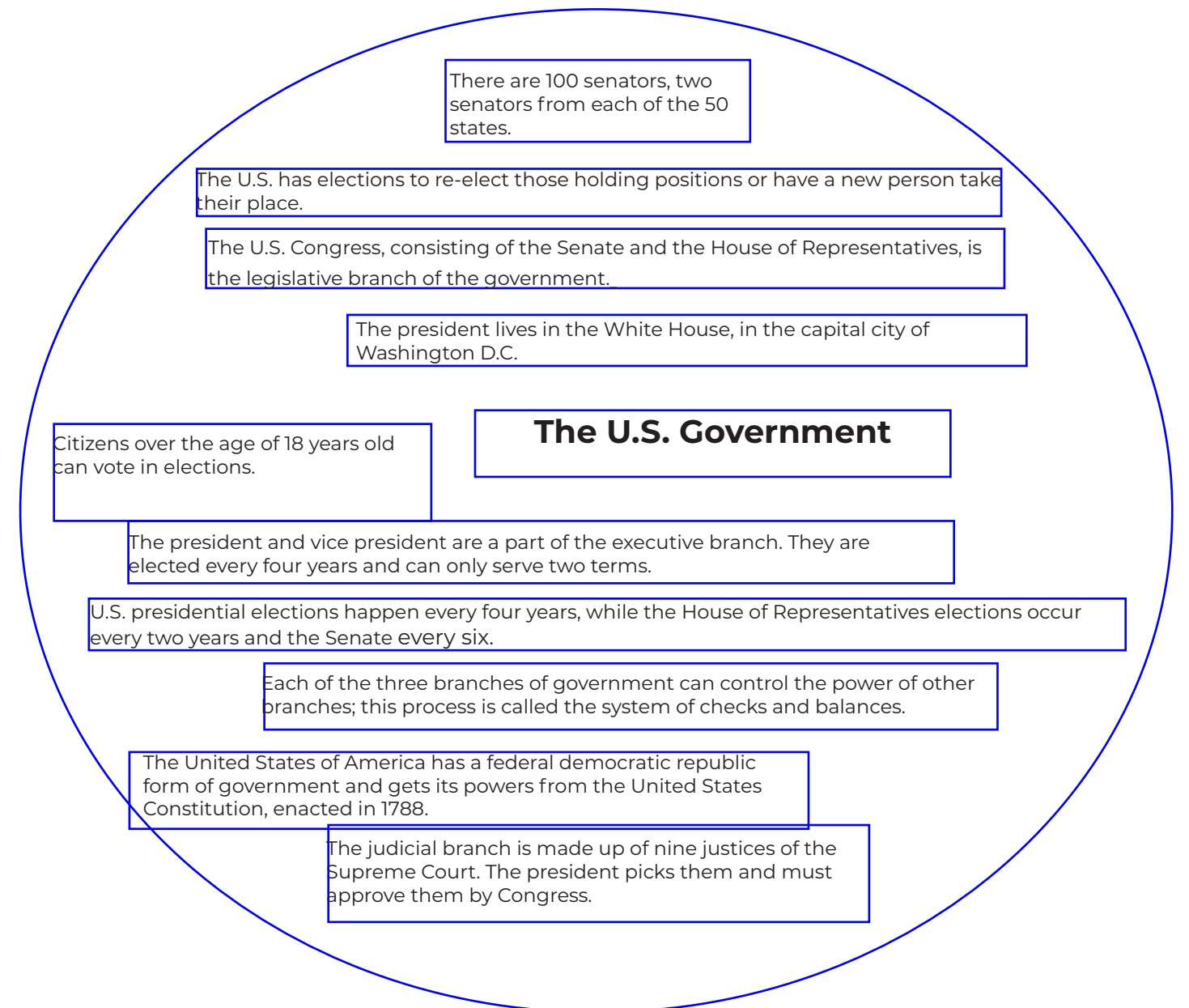
