

1. What are some of the different ways people celebrate the holidays?

In Australia, they have seaside celebrations with seafood, beach visits and time outside. Krampus, a half-man, a half-goat creature, is celebrated with parades and other events in the mountain towns of the Austrian, German and Hungarian Alps. He is like a "bad Santa" figure. In Italian folklore, La Befana, a witch-like woman who, like Santa, delivers gifts to children throughout Italy except on Epiphany Eve instead of Christmas Eve, is a celebrated figure. Scandinavian and German cultures burn a Yule log for good luck and eat a Yule Log dessert cake.

7. Those involved sing, carry candles and one pair dresses as the <u>holy couple</u>. Scripture is read during these visits, and mass—a series of <u>prayers</u> and <u>ceremonies</u> particular to the <u>Roman Catholic Church</u>—is held each day after the procession.

8. Other things associated with Las Posadas include <u>pinatas</u>, traditional <u>foods</u>, <u>nativity</u> scenes and <u>community</u> involvement.
