

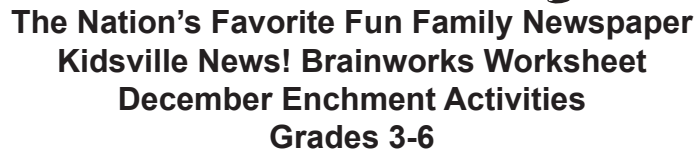

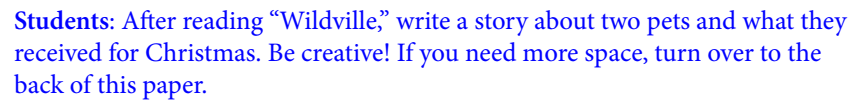
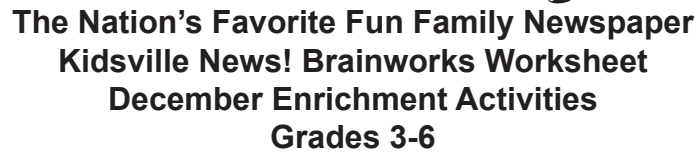

Students: After reading "Connections," answer the following questions about Christmas and holiday celebrations around the world.
Parents and teachers: Answers are below.

1. What are some of the different ways people celebrate the holidays?

In Australia, they have seaside celebrations with seafood, beach visits and time outside. Krampus, a half-man, a half-goat creature, is celebrated with parades and other events in the mountain towns of the Austrian, German and Hungarian Alps. He is like a "bad Santa" figure. In Italian folklore, La Befana, a witch-like woman who, like Santa, delivers gifts to children throughout Italy except on Epiphany Eve instead of Christmas Eve, is a celebrated figure. Scandinavian and German cultures burn a Yule log for good luck and eat a Yule Log dessert cake.

2. Why do people celebrate holidays differently?

Christmas traditions look different based on where people live and their cultural traditions.

3. What common characteristics do you see in all the celebrations?

They are all fun and festive. Events and activities help people gather and spend time together.

Students: After reading “Around the World,” fill in the blanks below with the correct terms from the passage. The first letter of each answer is provided.
Parents and teachers: Answers are below.

1. Las Posadas is a vibrant and meaningful tradition that unites communities and celebrates the journey of Mary and Joseph from Nazareth to Bethlehem and their attempts to find safe shelter before the birth of their child.
2. Joseph and Mary were unable to find lodging in Bethlehem and had to stay in a stable where Jesus was born.
3. The religious festival is celebrated primarily in Mexico between December 16 and 24, but also in parts of the United States and elsewhere with high numbers of Mexican and Guatemalan immigrants.
4. Posada is Spanish for “inn or lodging.” The celebration of Las Posadas involves a parade of carolers led by a small child dressed as an angel.
5. The tradition can be traced back to the 16th Century when Spanish missionaries sought to teach native people about the Christian faith.
6. Over nine nights, participants reenact Mary and Joseph’s search for lodging, going from house to house in the community.
7. Those involved sing, carry candles and one pair dresses as the holy couple. Scripture is read during these visits, and mass—a series of prayers and ceremonies particular to the Roman Catholic Church—is held each day after the procession.
8. Other things associated with Las Posadas include pinatas, traditional foods, nativity scenes and community involvement.
