

2. Explain the origins of Haiku.

Haiku is a traditional form of Japanese poetry popular around the world.

3. How do you write a Haiku?

Write a phrase, clause or sentence with 17 syllables arranged in five in the first line, seven in the second and five in the last line.

4. What are some things you could write a Haiku poem about?

Haikus are short poems usually written about things the reader knows a lot about or recognizes. Kids like you often write Haikus about animals, family, the seasons, sports and holidays, for example. You can also write "what am I" Haikus.

1. What is onomatopoeia?

Answer Key

Onomatopoeia is naming a thing or action by a vocal imitation of the sound associated with it. Onomatopoeia is a word that sounds like what it refers to or describes and is called in the literary world. Another definition is that the letter sounds combined in the word mimic the natural sound of the object or action, such as the word, *hiccup*.

2. How does onomatopoeia help readers?

It creates more sensory imagery and visual description. A a literary device, it helps readers hear the sounds of the words they reflect. It also adds fun and interest.

3. How is it used in poetry?

This literary device is used a great deal in poetry to create sensory imagery and visual description.

4. In what types of words so you commonly find onomatopoeia?

The different sounds of animals and action words often are onomatopoeia.
